



Scholars Vie for IU Honor Study

Long hours of extra language lab and book work are in store for 10 Jackson students, who have enrolled as candidates for the Indiana University Honors Summer Program, open to high school sophomores and juniors.

Representing Jackson in the competition for study in France will be Lauren Whisler, Roger Tolle, Bonnie Roper, and Cindi Miller. Hoping to study Spanish and German in foreign countries are Nancy Nuner and Kathy Kline, respectively. Latin contestants will be Dan McGill, Pam Talcott, Rita Roberts, and Carey McMann.

Regulations for applicants include completion of the third level in the language before the program starts in the summer and plans to continue into fourth year after the trip.

The qualified students will be required to take a listening comprehension test on Jan. 9. Those passing the test will complete lengthy application forms. If they become semi-finalists, interviews and speaking skill tests will follow with results of selections to be announced in April.

Destinations for the finalists are Saint Brieuc, France, San Luis Portose, Mexico, and Krefeld, Germany. Included in the sixty-day study tour are classes, lectures, and cultural events. Students will live with native families.

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Cagers, Wrestlers In Holiday Clashes; Swimmers Await New Year

Although school is out for the next two weeks, several athletic events will take place during the Christmas vacation.

Tomorrow the Tigers will try to make it two wins in a row as they host the LaVile Lancers on the Tiger court. The Lancers boast a 2-4 record, having won over North Judson last week by a score of 72-55. The Tigers have faced the Lancers only once before and lost to them in last year's sectional tourney.

DURING VACATION the Tigers will participate for the first time in the South Bend Holiday Tourney. Two preliminary games of the tourney will be held Dec. 20 on the Jackson Court with Riley facing St. Joseph and Central opposing Jackson.

On the same date LaSalle will host the other two preliminary games between Clay and Adams, and Washington and LaSalle. The final and semi-final games of the tourney will be held at South Bend Washington on Dec. 22.

On Dec. 27 at St. Joseph's high school the basketball B-team will participate in preliminaries of a Holiday Tourney. In the morning session St. Joseph's will meet Central, (8:45) and LaSalle faces Washington (10 a.m.)

In the afternoon session Riley goes against Adams (1:30) and Jackson against Clay (3). The final and semifinal games will be played at Adams on Dec. 28. Admission to all sessions is 25 cents for students and 50 cents for adults. Tickets will be sold at the gate only.

The freshman basketball team is idle during the vacation, but will play the Central Bears on the first day of returning to school, Jan. 3.

TURNING TO the wrestling scene, the matmen will also participate in a Holiday Tourney, held annually in the morning at the Wildcats' gym. The wrestlers will pair off against opponents from other schools in the city. Matches will be held, and by elimination a city champion is determined in each weight division.

In swimming, the annual city freshman-sophomore meet is scheduled for tomorrow at the Washington pool, with several from Jackson participating.

THE VARSITY SWIM TEAM is out of action during the vacation but challenges the Washington Panthers in the Tiger pool on the first day back to school and Mishawaka the following Friday, Jan. 6. Coach Allan Davison says, however, that there will be recreational swimming at Jackson throughout the seasonal recess.



Victory is Sweet as Tigers Down Clay

Jackson's Tigers finally broke the ice in the varsity basketball season with a long awaited victory over Clay's Colonials last Friday by a score of 59-57.

The win snapped a 22-game losing streak and left the Tigers with a 1-4 record for the season. The Tigers and the Colonials fought on even terms in the first quarter with the Colonials managing a 19-17 lead at the end of the period.

The Colonials, however, lost the services of their leading scorer and rebounder, Dennis Papczynski, for the second quarter after he collected three personal fouls in the first six minutes of the game. The Tigers took advantage of this situation in the second quarter to outscore the Colonials 18-6 and led at the half by a score of 35-25.

In the third period the Tigers were outscored 16-12 but still held a 6-point advantage going into the final period. In the fourth quarter, while leading 51-29, and with 5½ minutes to go, the Tigers started a stall, forcing the Colonials to foul to get the ball.

Terry Arme, the victim of these fouls, sunk five of six free throws in the last three minutes, including two with 25 seconds remaining. The last one gave Jackson a 59-55

lead, enough to withstand the final Clay basket with 8 seconds to go. Craig Marten led the scoring with 15 points while Jerry Tetzlaff added 11 points and Arme 9.

Matmen Lose To Penn, Niles
